Geography Draw Some MOUNTAINS

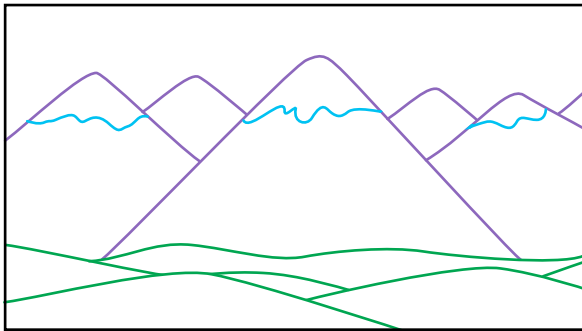
Hills are landforms that rise above the earth's surface.
Draw them near the bottom of the box.



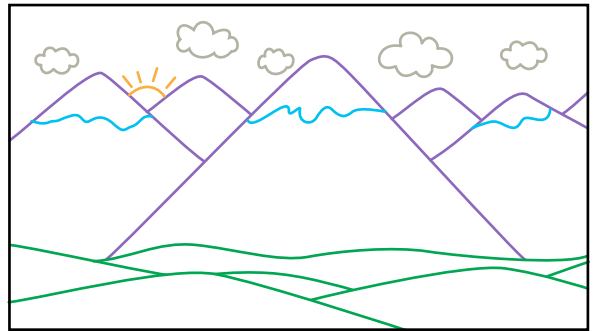
Mountains are steeper and larger than hills, and many form peaks. Draw them like upside down cones.



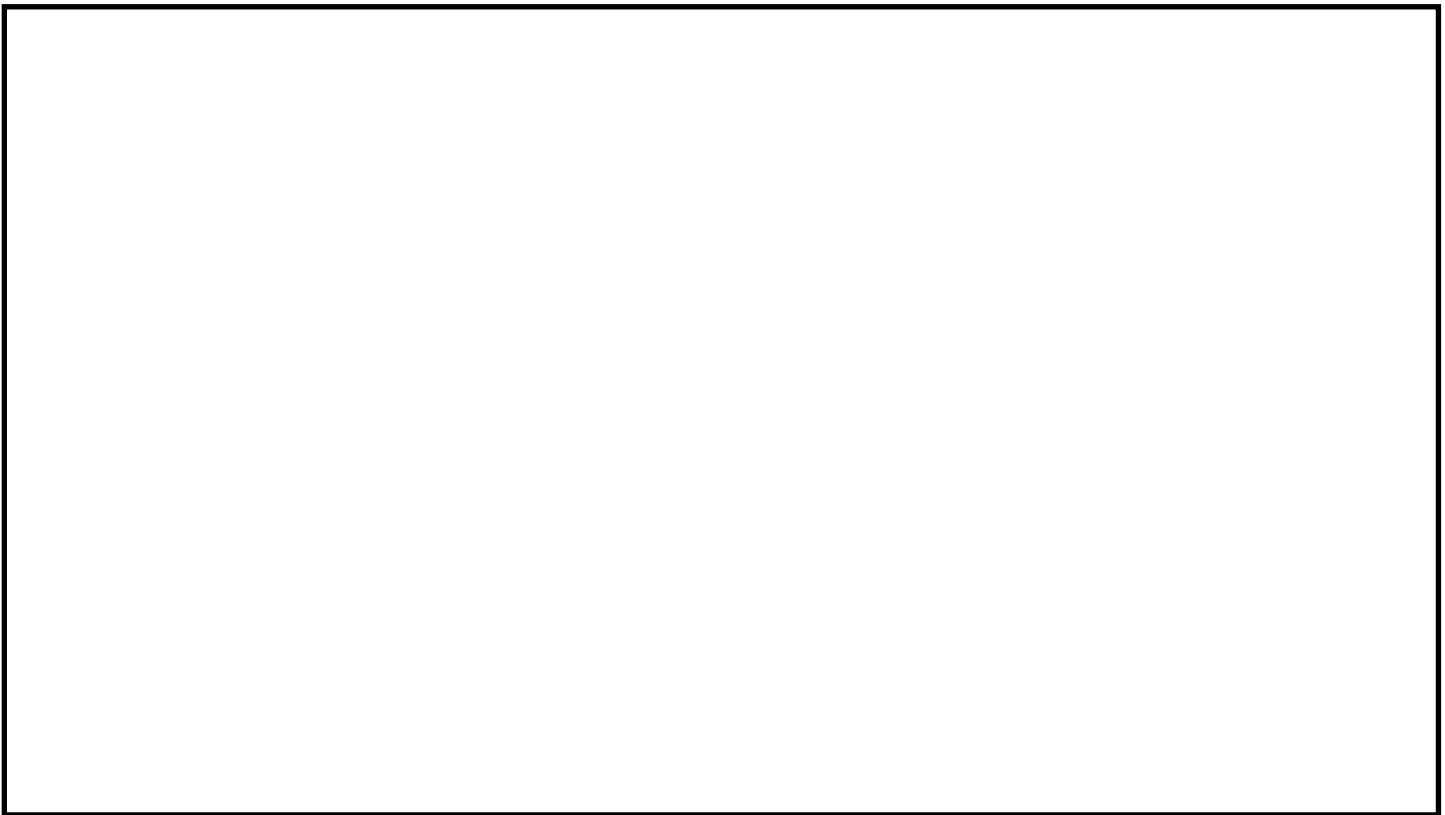
Many mountains are so high that they reach colder areas of the atmosphere. That's what causes the peaks to have snow.

Finish off your drawing with puffy clouds and a sun made from semi circular shapes.

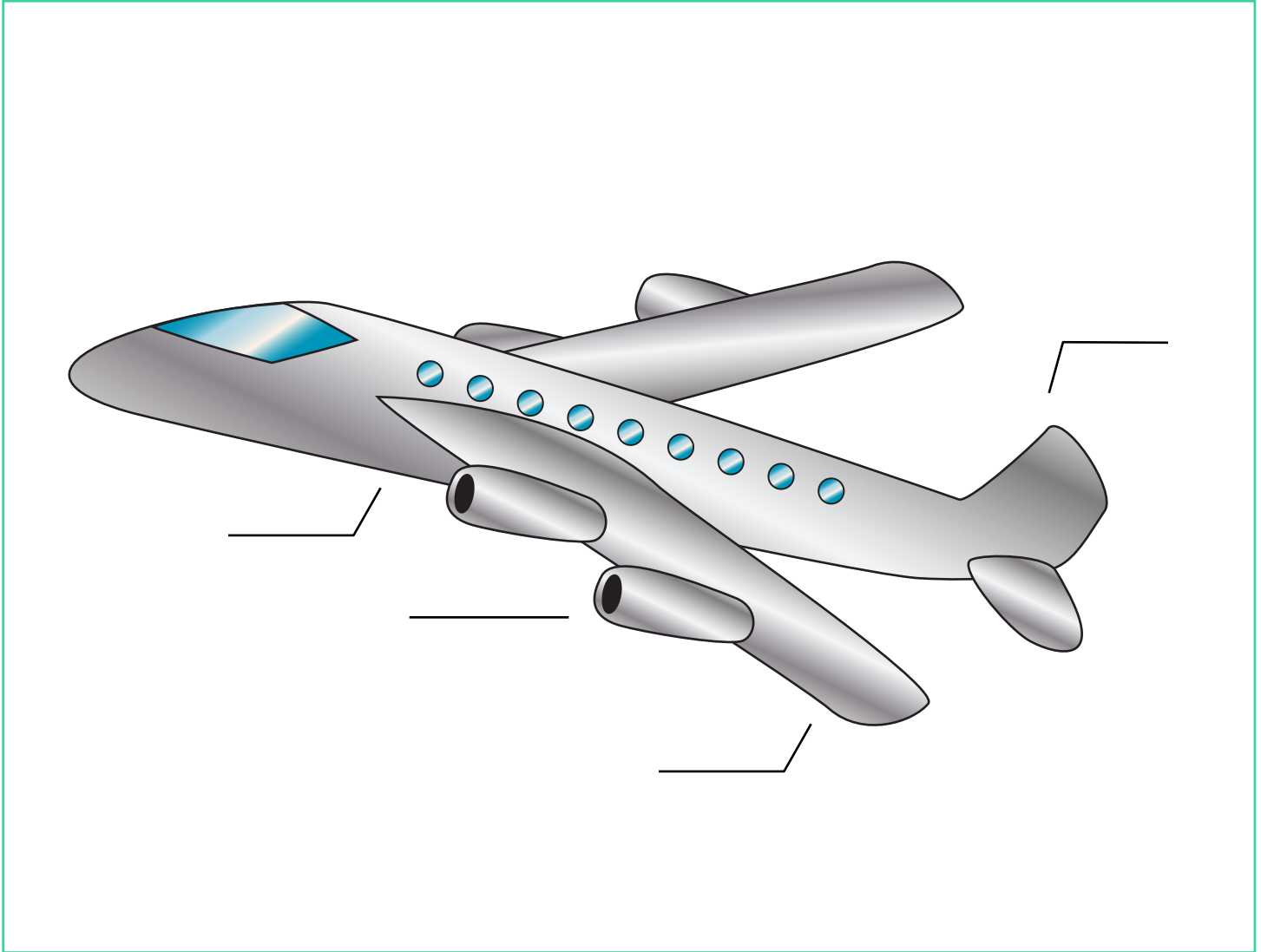

Wing: The parts on the side that keep the plane up in the air.

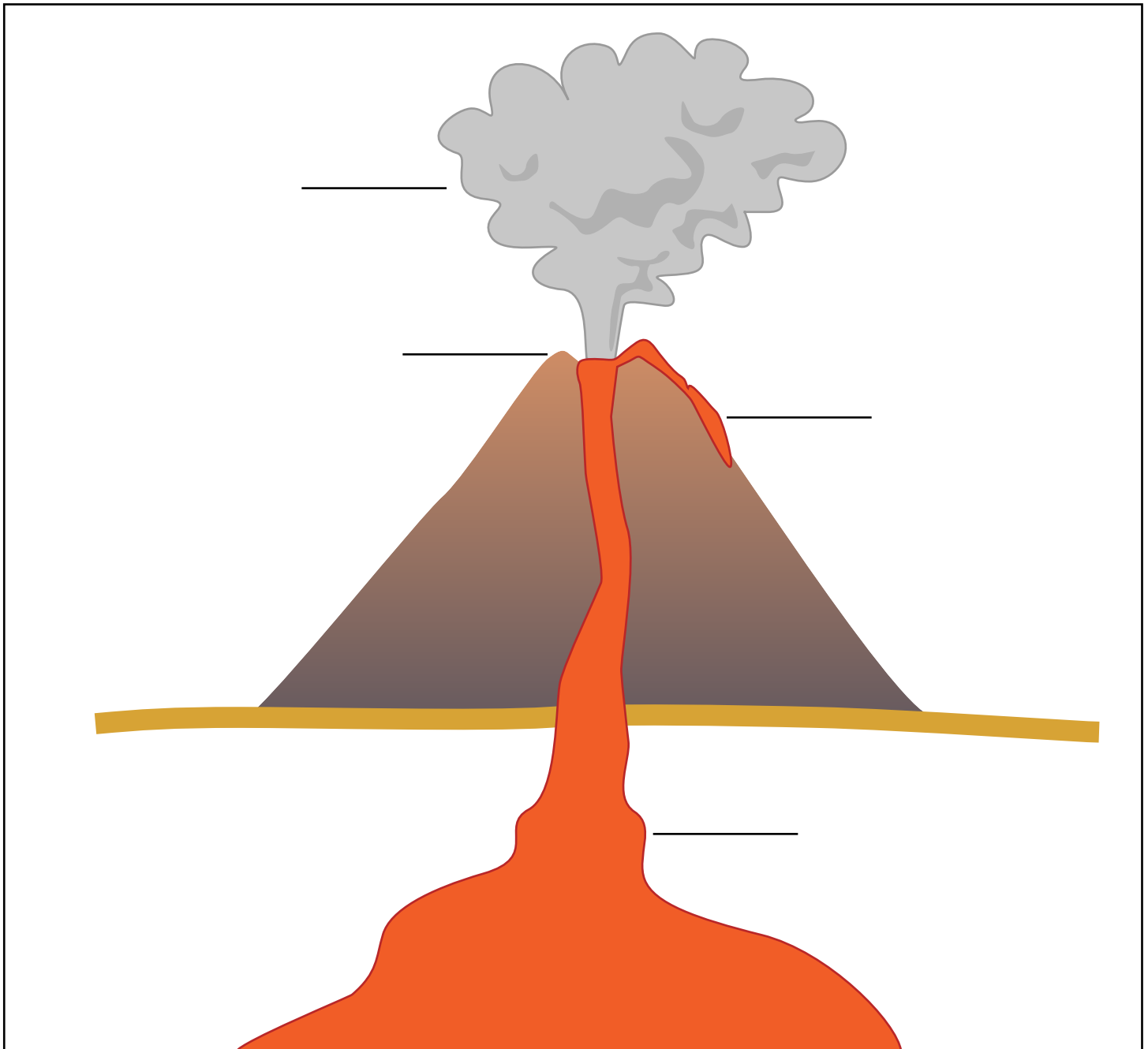
Engine: Moves the airplane forward with a great force.

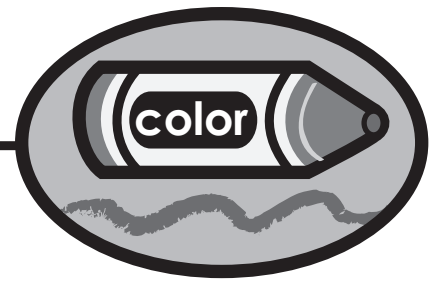

Statue of Liberty



The Statue of Liberty stands on Liberty Island in New York Harbor. She was a gift to the United States from the people of France on July 4, 1884.

The robed figure represents Libertas, the Roman goddess of freedom.

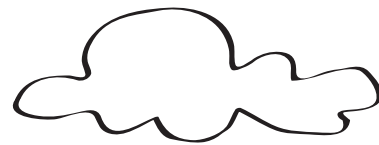
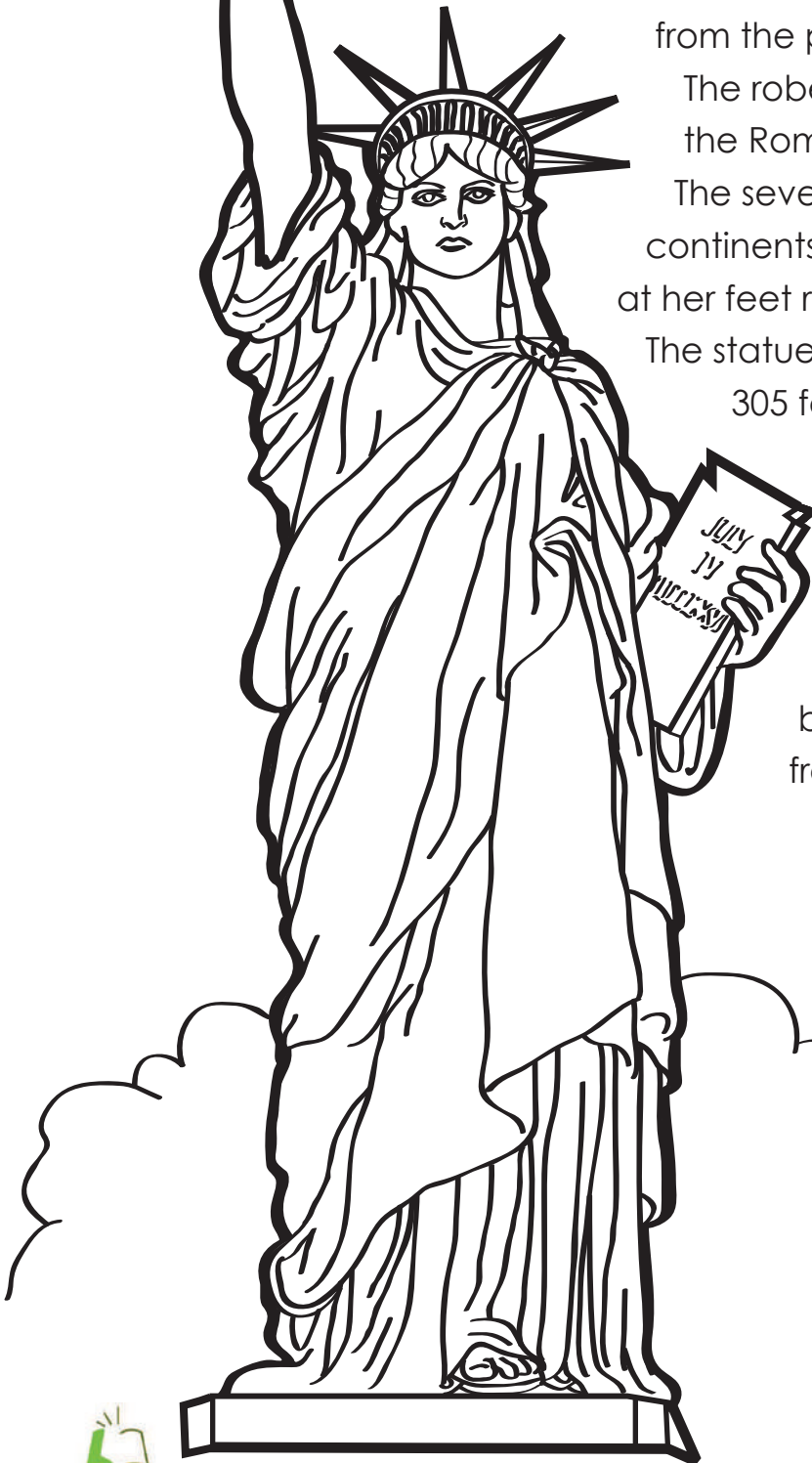
The seven spikes represent the seven continents and oceans. The broken chain at her feet represent the end of slavery.

The statue stands on a pedestal and reaches 305 feet into the air. She was made with

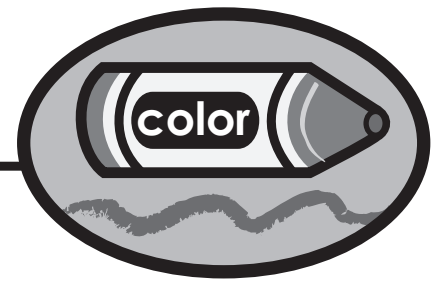
an iron frame and covered with

pure copper. Her blue-green color is due to age and exposure to water. Her torch

was once used as a lighthouse, but will always be the light of freedom and the path to Liberty.

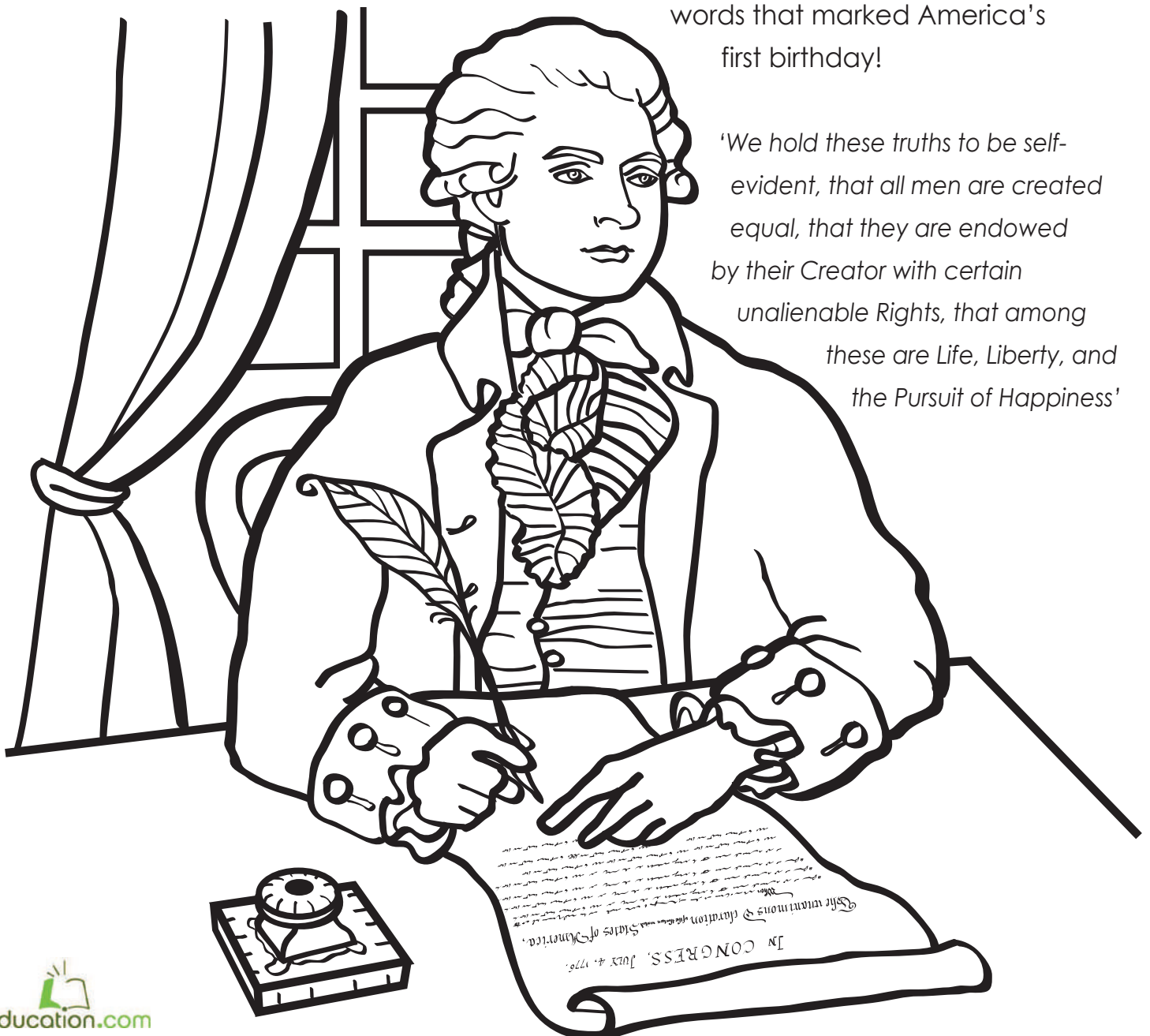


The Declaration of Independence















The Declaration of Independence was the formal statement announcing that the thirteen American Colonies were now independent states, and no longer a part of the British Empire. The historical document was written by Thomas Jefferson. Eighty-six changes were made by John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Robert R. Livingston, and Roger Sherman. When their final draft was submitted to the Continental Congress, the vote for independence was made. After final revisions, it was released to the public on July 4, 1776. Bells were rung to gather citizens and read the powerful

words that marked America's first birthday!

'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness'









Take turns tossing pennies into the ring. The one who makes the most pennies in, wins!

	<p style="text-align: center;">HOW TO PLAY!</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Place three stacks of the monster parts on the squares marked in the center of the game board. Players roll the die to move their pieces. When they land on a spot, they pick up the same game card from the piles in the center of the board. <i>If you land on a square and there are no more pieces left for that item, you can choose a card from another pile.</i> The game is finished when all the game cards have been picked up. Players then assemble the cards into fun monsters made of one of each of the the head, body, and feet pieces. The one with the most completed monsters wins!

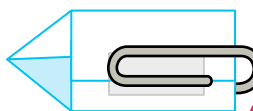




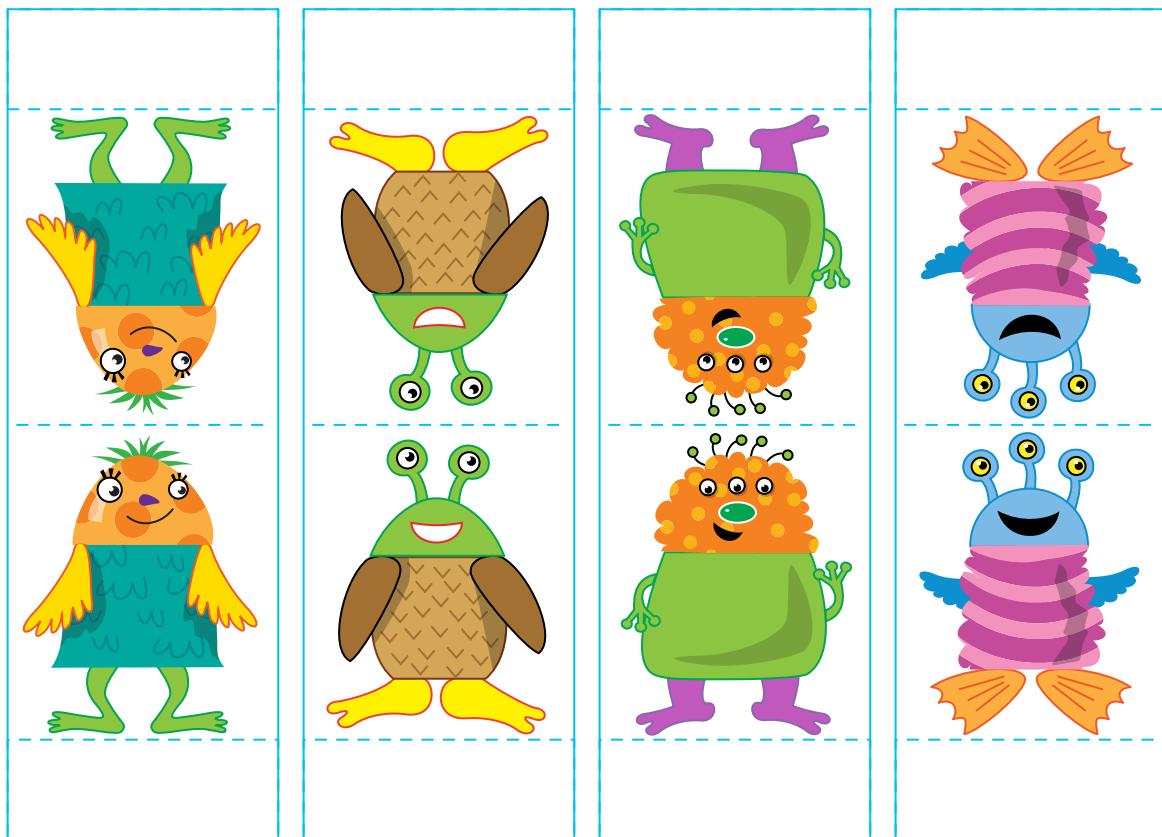

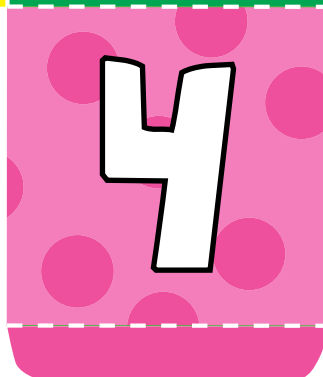
